EDUCATIONAL NEWS

Woodworking Activities Continue To Attract More Than 60

With the addition of many new members, some additions were made to woodworking activities. Sixty-six members are working in the shop regularly. These activities are in operation from Monday evening at 6 until Thursday at 7:00 P.M. An afternoon class is held on Thursday, enabling members of the Camp Overhead and men on camp detail to get their work in shop.

Many new patterns have been secured through the courtesy of Mr. Robert Armstrong, WPA RECREATIONAL SUPERVISOR of the WPA. These new patterns have proved a stimulus. Some of the members put in as many as 9 hours per week.

New projects for display have been made and are at present on display in a new case made in the shop for the reading room and additional ones are on display in the woodshop.

It is desired that as many as can be accommodated have advantage of these shop activities. Many very excellent projects have been made. The adviser desires that all members make an effort to report at the shop at their designated time. If this be done, it will prevent the confusion of too large a number in the shop at one time. The only other activity that approaches it in enrollment is First Aid and spelling. Two instructors are kept very busy four evenings per week. The objective to make this activity the center of attraction has been realized.

Woodworking can be used to an advantage by any enrollee interested in that line of work. Even if you are altogether unexperienced in shop, now is the time to learn.




